Report from our friend Lawrence Abbott on 99Rise and the Occupation at the State Capital

It is said that just showing up is 90% of winning. I believe this to be true. For those of us peacefully fighting to win the good fight for love and justice the stakes could not be higher. Corporate/oligarchic controls of our government, policies, and our politics, and with mainstream media growing in power, we have a very narrow window of opportunity to save our democracy. We also have a very narrow window of opportunity to save our dying planet. By uniting environmental and social justice movements we have the best chance to save our planet by returning power to the people.

This is why I jumped at the chance to represent MoveOn.org on the 99Rise California March for Democracy, and Occupation/Capitol Sit-in. I did not march many of the 500 miles from L.A. to Sacramento, but I was helping the effort as part of the Northern California Support Team. MoveOn recruitment tools helped get the word out to members along the March route and helped to make the community forums a big success. I also did my best to inform everyone in our area involved with labor, environment, and peace and justice. As Harvard professor Lawrence Lessig says, "Your issue is most important, but getting the money out of politics is the first one we must tackle together." This was the mission of the March and Occupation.

The March left L.A. on May 17th and arrived at the Capitol on June 22nd. That was when everything changed for me. I physically joined this group of super dedicated citizens for the 12 days of the occupation and began living the change by their side. By day we organized, trained, and set up delegations to meet with our representatives inside the Capitol. We entered every office of every Assembly person, Senator, and the Governor, telling our story and seeking support for reform legislation. We sought the leaders that would publically acknowledge the crisis of corruption of money in politics. Every day we stayed in the rotunda under the dome to rally, sit-in, sing, and demand needed change. We stayed until the last moment when they kicked us out at closing time. Those unwilling to leave were arrested. Much of this was live-streamed onto the internet for viewing and a documentary movie. At night we rotated shifts on the sidewalk at our information table. We occupied 24 hours a day! We caught the eye of the homeless people who tend to be nocturnal, and some of these great folks joined our effort. Outreach was 24 hours a day!

Outreach was the key to our successes. The March and Occupation created the space for people to really listen. Everyone that heard our stories became supporters and had their own stories to share. (Except for a few conservative reps, and some highly paid lobbyists that were honest enough to say that money in politics was their very good income!) Every one of our supported bills passed or moved forward! Many leaders stepped forward and spoke on the record about the need to end money in politics. Our movement has grown and become more organized and connected. Every politician in the Capitol has been put on notice. We know our Champions and we also know those that need more outreach, or to find a new job! We showed up and we won. As our fellow marcher Dolores Huerta says, "Si se puede!" Yes we Can!
